## NATIONAL POLICE WEEK - OFFICER SAFETY RESOURCES - 2025

In 2024, 147 law enforcement officers were killed in the line of duty, a 25% increase over 2023<sup>1</sup>. As law enforcement agencies commemorate [National Police Week](#), it is essential to honor the sacrifices of those who have served by striving to improve the safety and well-being of law enforcement personnel and their communities.

In addition to sponsoring community events, organizing and attending vigils to honor the fallen, and building key partners to help commemorate those who have been lost, we urge Chiefs of Police during National Police Week and throughout 2025 to focus on measures and actions to help keep officers safe.

- **Bulletin: First Responder Communication Capabilities in New Buildings**
  - This bulletin addresses key considerations and actions for the Chief of Police when engaging with local building officials to ensure officers can effectively use radio communication platforms in large buildings.
- **Bulletin: Animal Calls for Service – Essential Policy Guidance to Keep Officers and the Community Safe**
  - Research continues to affirm the nexus between animal abuse and violence against humans, including police officers. - **Bulletin: Medical Care Policy and Training – Essential for Officer Safety and Wellness**
  - This bulletin outlines key considerations for the Chief of Police and includes a Medical Care Sample Policy. A key tenet of officer safety and wellness is providing policy guidance on medical equipment and supplies for officers and police vehicles, a clear understanding of critical definitions, procedures for requesting EMS, an officer's role in providing medical care, and minimum training standards.
